# **Elections to the Nominating Committee for External Members of the Council**

1 May 2019

The Vice-Chancellor gives notice of an election to fill vacancies on the Nominating Committee for External Members of the Council in the following classes:

- (c) one member elected by the Regent House from among those who at the time of election are current members of Council in classes (a), (b), and (c);
- (d) two members of the Senate elected by the Regent House.

Elected members would serve for four years from 1 October 2019. The Committee identifies candidates to serve as external members of Council and recommends them to the Council for appointment by Grace. No person may be a member of the Committee in class (*d*) who is a member of the Council or who holds any of the University offices of Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Registrary, or Director or Deputy Director in the University Offices. Further information about the Committee is available in the *Statutes and Ordinances* (p. 113) and from the Registrary (email: Registrary@admin.cam.ac.uk).

The University is committed to equality, which includes supporting and encouraging all under-represented groups, promoting an inclusive culture, and valuing diversity. Nominations from groups that are under-represented on the Committee are welcomed.

#### Nomination procedure and election timetable

In order to be eligible, nominations must be received by 12 noon on Thursday, 16 May 2019. The Vice-Chancellor asks candidates to send nominations by post to the Registrary in the Old Schools or as scanned documents containing signatures by email to Registrary@admin.cam.ac.uk or by fax to 01223 (3)32332.

The nomination paper should include (a) a statement signed by two members of the Regent House, nominating the candidate for election and specifying the body and the class for which the candidate is standing for election, and (b) a statement signed by the candidate confirming consent to be nominated. The candidate should also provide a personal statement of no more than 500 words in length that should cover the following points:

- the candidate's present position in the University;
- previous posts held, whether in Cambridge or in other universities or outside the university system, with dates;
- the candidate's reasons for standing for election, and the experience and skills they would bring to the role;
- a note of the candidate's particular interests within the field of University business.

Nominations will be published on the Senate-House Noticeboard as they are received; the complete list of nominations will be published in the *Reporter* on Wednesday, 22 May 2019.

If an election is contested, there will be a ballot under the Single Transferable Vote regulations. Online voting will open at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, 28 May 2019 and close at 5 p.m. on Friday, 7 June 2019. Hardcopy voting papers and supporting materials will be distributed by Tuesday, 28 May 2019 to those who opted by 2 November 2018 to vote on paper; the last date for the return of voting papers will be **5 p.m. on Friday**, **7 June 2019**.

# Historical Tripos 2020: Subjects and periods

The culture of the miraculous in Renaissance Italy

Further to the Notice published on 25 July 2018 (Reporter, 6516, 2017–18, p. 851), the Faculty Board of History gives notice that the special and specified subjects for Part II of the Historical Tripos, 2020, have been amended as follows:

- 25 Ireland and the Irish since the Famine

Candidates for Part II in 2020, who have previously taken Part I of the Historical Tripos and who did not offer in that Part a paper falling mainly in the period before 1750, may meet the requirement to take a pre-1750 paper in Part II by offering one of the Special Subjects A, B, C, D, E or F, or by offering one of the Papers 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17 and 21 *or* a dissertation, provided that its subject falls mainly in the period before 1750.

Candidates for Part II in 2020, who have previously taken Part I of the Historical Tripos and who did not offer in that Part a paper in European History, may meet the requirement to take a European History paper in Part II by offering one of the following papers: 7, 8, 14, 21, 22 and 23.

The Faculty Board is satisfied that no candidate's preparation for examination will be adversely affected by these amendments.

# First-stage Report of the Council on the refurbishment of 1 Regent Street for the Cambridge Institute for Sustainability Leadership

The COUNCIL begs leave to report to the University as follows:

- 1. In this Report the Council is seeking approval in principle for the refurbishment of an office building at 1 Regent Street to provide accommodation for the Cambridge Institute for Sustainability Leadership (CISL) and to host a sustainable business hub.
- 2. The 1 Regent Street site was formerly occupied by Cambridge Assessment. A proposal to sell Furness Lodge to Emmanuel College, grant a long lease for the current car park to the same College, and to retain the office building for the University's operational use or for commercial letting, was approved by Grace 2 of 7 June 2017.
- 3. CISL has outgrown its current accommodation in Cambridge and this is impacting its current and future strategy. The Planning and Resources Committee agreed to allocate the building at 1 Regent Street to CISL as part of a Concept Case for the project, which was approved on 13 December 2017. The refurbished building will have a gross internal area of 3,026m<sup>2</sup>. CISL will have 1,148m<sup>2</sup>,

- the sustainable business hub will have 794m<sup>2</sup>, and 1,084m<sup>2</sup> will be shared space. CISL will surrender its current accommodation on Trumpington Street and Bene't Place.
- 4. The project will be funded in large part by a benefaction of £6m from Envision Energy (Jiangsu) Co Ltd, payable over two years. In recognition of this donation, the building will be renamed the Entopia Building.
- 5. Further details relating to the design, maintenance, capital, and recurrent costs of the project and sources of funding will be brought to future meetings of the Buildings Committee and the Planning and Resources Committee. A Second-stage Report will be published in due course to seek approval for implementation of the project.
- 6. Drawings of the proposed scheme are displayed for the information of the University in the Schools Arcade and are reproduced online at https://www.prao.admin.cam.ac. uk/capital-planning/plans-and-drawings. A location plan is shown below (p. 497).

- 7. The Council recommends:
- I. That approval in principle be given for the refurbishment of 1 Regent Street to provide accommodation for the Cambridge Institute for Sustainability Leadership and to host a sustainable business hub.
- II. That the Director of Estate Strategy be authorised to apply for detailed planning approval in due course.
